South opens $1^{(1)}$. North responds $2 \boldsymbol{}$ showing $9+$ points. This is better than a 1NT or 2NT response. South needs to find a bid to show his 16 points. A jump rebid in hearts would show a 6 card suit, so South makes the correct bid of 2NT showing a balanced hand and 15-16 (after a change of suit at the two level). Now North knows there is enough strength for game and bids 3NT.

There are various ways to bid the South hand, but opening and making a jump rebid of 3 is probably best. With such an unbalanced hand South removes 3NT to 4か, although both contracts are likely to make in practice.

North's negative double shows 4+ hearts and 6+ points. South treats the double like a 19 response and rebids 1 NT to show 1516 points. When West competes with 2 neither North nor South has anything further to say.

South has an unbalanced hand and opens $\mathbf{1}^{\boldsymbol{1}}$, his longer suit. North shows his 4 card major, bidding 14. South can show his second suit as it is "below the barrier" and rebids $2 \uparrow$. The bid of a second suit shows that South has at least 5 hearts and 4 diamonds. North has 3 card support for hearts and rebids $2 \boldsymbol{\vartheta}$ to show his preference for the suit and only 6-9 points. Because North did not jump bid south knows there is not enough for game and he passes.
